This shows how well Film Festivals are viewed overseas especially those related to the more commercial world.

We are now planning the first visit to the Regional areas of Victoria and have previously requested information on what you want us to include. I have to report that there have been a few replies and for those that we have it is, as always, the 'usual suspects'. However we are working on the plan for visits later in the year.

So going back to what was covered at the AGM, I am asking those who attended what was good and what you think we should change. The issues of sound quality can be quite a problem especially for those societies that have hard surfaces in the venue where they are showing. Some societies have been able to solve these problems and we are interested in the manner in which this has been done. It is our intention to produce an Information Sheet covering the way in which Societies have handled this problem.

In it, I was trying to articulate what makes a successful Film Society, which Yarra Ranges have proved they are. I would appreciate any comments on the content of my speech.

# 34<sup>th</sup> Warburton Film Festival Opening Speech

Good Evening

It is a great honour to be asked to open this excellent and enduring Film Festival in the Yarra Valley for the third time. I must not have made too many mistakes in the past and I hope that continues tonight.

This is the 34<sup>th</sup> Annual Warburton Film Festival and the continuation of this film festival is due to the dedication of the members of the Yarra Ranges Film Society and the support of all of you here who attend as well as the showing of mostly wonderful films.

This got me thinking about Film Festivals and the increasing number of them around the world.

Of course there are the ones that we all know well, such as the Cannes Film Festival, the Toronto Film Festival, the Melbourne International Film Festival and there are smaller ones too such as this one.

Lately the Federation of Victorian Film Societies has been advised of a number of festivals in various parts of the world and it is interesting to think about what are the characteristics of good film festivals.

Firstly, they all seem to have a great location such as Sundance Film Festival (Park City Utah in the middle of the ski season), Calgary Film Festival (at Stampede time), Tribeca Film Festival (in New York at Easter Parade time) and others throughout Europe too numerous to mention.

Secondly, they show support for new and emerging film makers in both feature length and short films.

Paul Cox, patron of this festival until his death at this time last year, said in his opening speech to the Byron Bay Film Festival just two years ago,

*"This is an important festival and for those young people who screen here for the first time it can be a life-changing experience. They will realize the power of the big screen and that they don't have to be afraid of commercial failure."*

This can absolutely apply to this festival shown by the strong encouragement in the Golden Shorts award and program.

Recently the Federation received a request for help on a particular matter from the Curacao Film Festival. They hold their festival, "Curacao International Film Festival Rotterdam" in April each year and they also have a short film festival as part as this. They allow the winning film from the festival to travel to each of the Caribbean Islands and be entered in the film festival of each of these islands thus expanding their reach to a much wider set of festivals

Thirdly, Film Festivals bring the community together in an event that promotes conversations between various groups because of their interest in film, talking about the festival films and others films they have seen in the past, telling their friends about them and all in an environment where it is friendly and easy.

Lastly, Film Festivals enable all of us to get away from our normal world and live in another world for just a little while. We can be what we are not in the day to day world.

Welcome to the world of Film Festivals.

Paul Cox also finished by saying

*"Isn't the cinema given to us to become richer in spirit"*

In view of the world today what a great aim.

With that thought, it is with great pleasure that I declare open the 34<sup>th</sup> Annual Warburton Film Festival.

I wish you all enjoyable viewing and great conversations.

Eight screenings which began on the Friday night and finished on Sunday afternoon were enjoyed, discussed and voted on with great enthusiasm. There was a selection of drama, comedy and documentaries from five different countries. A highlight was the 2015 film **Tanna** which was filmed on the island of Tanna in Vanuatu. We were lucky to have the Co-Director and Cinematographer Bentley Dean, his wife and young children join us for a Q and A session after the film. The family had lived on the island during the filming and their stories and experiences were shared with us. The children were delightful and confidently spoke on the microphone about some favourite things! The StarBox rating was 4.8!

**Looking for Grace**, an Australian comedy/drama was received with a variety of opinions being expressed. Katie Milwright, also a Cinematographer, attended and joined us for a Q and A. These sessions really bring the film to life and add a special insight.

The 2016 French film, **Frantz**, a drama, was also widely discussed, enjoyed and voted highly. It was an interesting film being a nominee for Best Foreign Language Film (BAFTA). This film was another highlight of the festival selection.

A tribute to our patron Paul Cox was held on the Sunday afternoon. Paul sadly passed away during last year's film festival and this was our opportunity to celebrate his life and his contributions to the film industry. During this session a documentary **The Nude in the Window**, showed his early days in Australia and how he became a film maker. Dagmar Limp and Maggie Sail spoke fondly of their friendship with Paul Cox and his family.

The Show Us Your Shorts (SUYS) short film competition was run in conjunction with the Festival screenings again. A variety of films were shown demonstrating the expertise and talent of many young film makers. We were fortunate to have a number of prize winners attend and able to view their work on the big screen. The short film contributions were an added asset to the Festival and the film makers themselves were enthusiastic and delighted to be there.

A wonderful weekend was enjoyed with an amazing variety of films, inspiring shorts and the opportunity to discuss, meet new friends, rekindle old friendships, dining and wining with great food and fine wines! A very successful weekend on many different fronts! We all enjoyed the buzz that emanated in the little town of Warburton. We invite, welcome and look forward to the 2018 Film Festival.

# Succession Planning

The workshop on "Succession Planning" delivered at the FVFS March AGM has been instrumental in developing a society "Manual" for changing roles on our Film Society Committee.

The need for multiskilling of committee members came more than a year ago when it was discovered that both the President and the Secretary/Treasurer of our society were unavailable to set up and run a particular screening due to absence. These two members were the only committee members familiar with this task. Who could take over the setup/screening? It became quickly apparent that other committee members would need to be trained, so a one hour professional development session was organised at our screening venue to "train" up two more committee members with that skill. In addition a "step by step" written procedure that covered the same information was developed, a copy given to both participants and a laminated copy included in our box of equipment taken to the venue. We now have four committee members all capable of running a screening.

But there is much more to managing a Film Society than just running the screening. As I sat in one of the FVFS AGM workshop sessions in March this year, it dawned on me that much of the "backroom stuff" involves processing memberships, banking subscriptions, seeking screening rights, producing the program and purchasing DVD's. This was only known to me as I had performed and refined these tasks for over twenty years, and was all in my head and unknown to other committee members.

Following the AGM I decided to develop a printed timeline of tasks that needs to be undertaken each year. This extends from film selection by the committee in October through to the distribution of membership badges at our first screening in February. This is now well underway and is expected to be available to all members of the committee in the near future. In addition to this we have elected a new treasurer which is now separate to the secretary's role but still connected due to the processing of membership forms and subscriptions. As a result, another committee member will now become more familiar with the "backroom stuff".

Hopefully the steps we have taken will smooth the way for any transition in the future. I certainly believe what we have done will make the process much easier.

## **North Bellarine To Host Film Festival**

The inaugural North Bellarine Film Festival will be launched later this year featuring international films, an academic film symposium and a virtual reality display. The event will be held from November 17<sup>th</sup> to 19<sup>th</sup> in Drysdale and Portarlington. Short films by young Australian film makers and a children's film will be included in the festival.

The Black Box Theatre in the Potato Shed at Drysdale will screen most of the films with a gala opening on November 17<sup>th</sup>. RMIT University, one of the sponsors of the festival, will stage the symposium in Portarlington earlier in the day. Titled 'Now What? Cinematic Stories for the Twenty-first Century', the symposium will feature 11 speakers. Part of the symposium will be open to the public.

Indoor cinematography drones and programmed flying camera robots will be part of the RMIT University virtual reality display at the Portarlington Neighbourhood House on November 18<sup>th</sup>, followed by a free children's film. Two international films will also be shown at the Black Box Theatre that day.

A collection of short films and animation shorts by young Australian film makers and an international film will be screened at Portarlington and Drysdale on November 19<sup>th</sup>.

Festival films will be announced in August when tickets will go on sale.

## Freak of Navigation

The passenger steamer SS Warrimoo was quietly knifing its way through the waters of the mid-Pacific on its way from Vancouver to Australia.

The navigator had just finished working out a star fix and brought the result to the master, Captain John Phillips.

The Warrimoo's position was LAT. 0 degrees 31' N and LON, 179 degrees 30' W.

The date was 30 December 1899.

First Mate Payton broke in....."You know what this means.....we're only a few miles from the intersection of the Equator and the International Date Line"

Captain Phillips was prankish enough to take full advantage of the opportunity for achieving this navigational freak of a lifetime.

He called his navigators to the bridge to check and double check the ship's position.

He changed course slightly so as to bear directly on his mark.

Then he adjusted the engine speed.

The calm weather and clear night worked in his favour.

At midnight the SS Warrimoo lay on the Equator at exactly the point where it crosses the International Date Line.

The consequences of this bizarre position were several:-

The bow of the ship was in the Southern Hemisphere and the middle of summer.

The stern was in the Northern Hemisphere and in the middle of winter.

The date in the aft part of the ship was 31 December 1899.

Forward it was 1 January 1900.

This ship was therefore not only in two different days, two different months, two different years and two different seasons, but in two different centuries all at the same time.

## Calculating your StarBox scores.

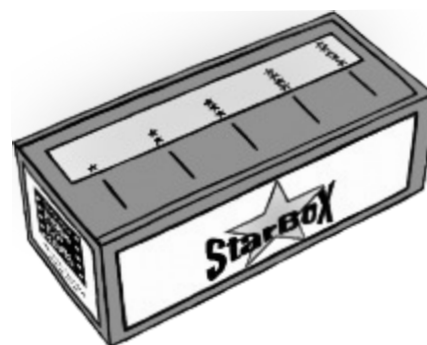
We have designed a simple Excel calculator to make it easier to calculate your StarBox scores. Just download Information Sheet 25A from the FVFS website and save it where it will be most accessible for you. This “document” is actually an Excel sheet called “StarBox Calculator.xls”. It is easy to use by simply entering the number of votes into the five cells in the sheet marked from five to one star. The average score and total votes are then calculated for you automatically. Note that the average score is rounded to one decimal place, as presented in our StarBox Scores in ReelNews and in Information Sheet 17.

The Excel sheet is “protected” against entering data in any but the five “input” cells.
